If your community was an artwork what would it look like? In 2023 Artist Keith Khan was invited to create unique artworks to celebrate our communities and each of the 33 wards of Leeds. From Keith's visits to wards, he was inspired by local landmarks, by historical facts, by geography and stories revealed to him by the Neighbourhood Hosts of My LEEDS 2023. These artworks were created into both textile and animated form.

Celebrating the fabric of community

Inspired by our region's textile heritage, the 33 artworks were transformed by Keith into a textile design, which was then generously woven by British luxury brand Burberry, on jacquard looms at Burberry's mill in Keighley. With this beautiful fabric a unique collection of garments was created by local designers, makers and fashion students at Leeds Arts University. During Summer 2023, this garment collection visited communities inviting people to wear their city with pride and building a photographic portrait of the city across the Summer.

The Gift

As a final gift to each of the wards, 33 textile artworks were designed by Keith and woven by Burberry, featuring each individual ward motif. These artworks were framed and gifted to each ward, going on permanent display in town halls, village halls and community spaces across the city.





66 These abstract shapes were inspired by each of the five villages that make up Adel and Wharfdale including Adel, Bramhope, Cookridge, Holt Park and Pool-in-Wharfedale.
99 For Alwoodley, I wanted to create a motif that represented a woosh of movement to reflect the energetic community and reference the range of local sports that the ward's Host is celebrating this Summer. ??






1 noticed this hand motif hand-carved into stone near a local food bank and church. Although this was made in the last century, the motif gave me hope and almost points from the past to the future. This symbol evokes human touch and felt like the right representation for community and unity.

66 Mike's Carpets is a famous carpet shop set in a former Methodist Church. As a local icon, I felt that everyone in the community would have a personal connection to it. 99








66 These shapes were inspired by the art nouveaustyle glass windows of the community's much-loved Bramley Baths. 99





66 These are the classic silhouettes of Burmantofts Pottery – once the largest producer of tiles and architectural ceramics in Yorkshire. 99

66 The interwoven marks are the warp and weft of a loom, referencing the area's historic connection to the textile industry. 99





Carnival. It was the first festival of its kind to showcase all three authentic elements of the celebration – costumes, music and a masquerade procession. It's also a reference to my own practice as I started as a Carnival designer. ??

The design references the original signage of the Arndale Centre in Crossgates - one of the first American-style shopping malls in England and with its shining art deco ceiling, which is such an important hub of activity for the community.






66 This design is a fern leaf, as the name 'Farnel' comes from the Old English word for fern. It's where the name Farnley originally came from. 99

66 A visit to the unique St Aidan's RSPB centre with Garforth's Host influenced the design of this piece. ?9







66 Guiseley Theatre is an important hub for the community. On this building there is a carving of a hand reaping wheat and huge buttons referencing the history of the area. 99





66 This design references the connecting fields of this huge, rural ward, a maypole or pylon, and the Harewood Stupa, the only Buddhist monument of its kind in the UK. 99 66 In amongst student and family houses the huge green space and skatepark buzzes with the energy and creativity that young people bring to Headingley and Hyde Park. 99







It might be urban but there is always nature here.
 This design is in homage to 'the bird in the window'
 an anecdote that Hunslet's Host shared with me on my visit.





The buildings in this design are inspired by the flats on the Killingbeck and Seacroft skyline. One of the amazing panoramas in Leeds. ??


66 There are five parishes that make up Kippax and Methley. Each one is represented in the shape of a spire and a wheat stalk. ??





66 Kirkstall is famous for its Abbey, which I visited with the Host during twilight. Hearing the history of the ward inspired these spinning gothic cogs, which could be a part of the monastery or refer to the ward's ironwork past. 99

66 From sturdy trucks to delicate stems, connecting lines and leaf shapes reflect the flourishing and diverse community at Little London and Woodhouse. 99






66 Coal mining is a huge part of the community's history, and as home to the oldest working railway in the world, the design features stylised coal and a railway track. ??

66 The first thing I felt when visiting Moortown was a sense of welcome, which is why I chose to depict this circle of houses hugging the outer ring of the design. The hand-like leaves at the centre are a symbol of celebration and a community in bloom. 99








66 The threads represent the connection between Morley South and Morley North, and are symbolic of the area's history in the textile industry. 99






66 I brought two incredible local achievements together using the shape of a wheel to reference both Otley's award-winning use of hydrotechnology and the huge charity bike ride one Yeadon resident just completed.


66 My visit to Pudsey was soundtracked by performances by some amazing local musicians. I reimagined their band stand surrounded by music notes as a symbol of the thriving musical community. 99







66 Roundhay is home to such an important green space in Leeds. The circular and plant-like shapes reference both the area's name and its iconic park. 99





66 The shapes mirror the beautifully manicured italian gardens of Temple Newsam, which I had the honour of seeing from the roof on our very special tour. 99

66 The curving lines reference Otley Road, the busy 10-mile road which winds through the ward. 99



66 The interweaving lines are designed to capture the gentle ebb and flow of the River Wharf, which I visited with the Host of Wetherby. The weirs and water bind and bring together this beautiful community. 99
